### **COMPLETED COURSEWORK**

- GEXTH 6035: Art Activism in the Community | Dr. Karen Frostig | Lesley University
  Activism is about change, and community is about relationships between diverse groups. The
  course investigates the rich interplay between art, identity, culture, and community, identifying
  sources of conflict, isolation, marginalization, and mediation. Arts activism is presented as a
  vehicle of communication linked to agency and empowerment, which are essential elements in
  expressive arts therapy practice. Students are introduced to art activist projects and
  experimental techniques promoting critical thinking, civic engagement, and social discourse
  across the political landscape.
- EARED 7102: Arts-Based Research | Dr. Young Song | Lesley University
  This course focuses on arts-based research in the arts, education, and social sciences. Students

EARTS 6001: Collaborative Symposium: Power of Arts in Communities and Schools | Dr. Lisa Donovan |
 Lesley University

A series of workshops led by artists and leaders in multicultural education will offer a variety of art modalities and avenues to understanding cultural differences. Participants will explore the integration of drama, dance, music, visual arts, storytelling, and poetry into multicultural approaches to teaching and learning. This symposium will emphasize collaborative work in the arts as a path toward democratic schooling and social justice.

EARED 6003: Equity, Access, and Inclusion through Arts-Based Inquiry | Tina Carter de la Cruz and Dr.
 Patrica Crain de Galarce | Lesley University

This course explores ways to approach human diversity and build an understanding of similarities and differences through drama, movement, visual arts, music, poetry, and literature. Application is made for the classroom and other work settings.

GINTC 6100: Identity and Belonging in a Categorized World | Dr. Michelle Vital | Lesley University
 This course focuses on the co-construction of self and culture, our quest for belonging, and the
 complexities of categorizing humans by sex, race, and other markers. We consider the social,
 psychological, and behavioral consequences of differing self-construals and how these manifest

- themselves in everyday life. We draw attention to our pursuit of belonging in teams and social groups and highlight the identity reconstruction and renewed strivings for inclusion.
- EARED 6999: Independent Study: The Correlation between Community Arts, Cultural Equity and Higher Education | Dr. Maureen Creegan-Quinquis | Lesley University Supervised independent exploration/research /project(s) of particular interest related to professional objectives.
- EARED 7106: Multiple Literacies: Social and Political Investigation | Denise Driscoll | Lesley University The course is designed to involve participants in exploring the creative use of some of the arts, including visual arts, poetry, and telling stories. Participants will use the arts to redefine literacy, understand their students' literacies, and enhance students' skills. The course will involve three significant elements: research, artmaking, and curriculum development. These elements will draw on what participants discover about the lives, families, and communities of their students and themselves. We will use a critical pedagogy approach to find and use the voices and experiences of participants and their students to shape the curriculum, understand the broader contexts of schooling, and create knowledge together. The course will also focus on using the arts for basic literacy and numeracy in the classroom.
- EARED 6117: Theory and Practice in Community Arts: Ideas into Action | Kit Jenkins | Lesley University This course will examine the historical and contemporary theoretical frameworks that have shaped community arts in various artistic disciplines. Why has the community arts movement taken hold in the United States of America and across the international spectrum? Research proves that the arts bolster economic development, connect neighborhoods and cultural/ethnic groups, and revitalize (physically and emotionally) urban and rural places. To achieve these dynamic possibilities, we must know how to turn ideas into action by gaining crucial skills in arts administration, audience development, and project development.
- MBAMGT 650: Organizational Analysis and Skills | Fall 2007 | University of Massachusetts at Boston This course focuses on the organization of the future, identifying its characteristics and exploring the strategic design and political and cultural implications for working in and managing such an organization. It examines the impact of the new organization on the roles and careers of individual managers, the functioning of groups, the processes within organizations, the relationships of organizations with their environments, and the learning and change practices needed to enhance global performance. First-semester MBA students are introduced to a variety of skills that they will be called upon to use throughout their MBA experience (case analysis, analytical writing, self-awareness, team-building, oral communication).
- MBAMGT 697: Special Topics+ | Spring 2008 | University of Massachusetts at Boston

This course addresses a specific topic in a particular discipline. Courses under this title are offered as one-time supplements to a given department's curriculum.
